A YEAR AFTER THE "CRISIS FOR MICHIGAN'S POOR," POVERTY IS UP

A year ago we published a story about all of the negative factors hitting (or about to hit) the poorest of Michigan citizens. According to the League for Public Policy, this year's news is that poverty is up, income is down, but fewer Michigan citizens are uninsured.

The American Community Survey found that Michigan's poverty rate rose to 17.5 percent in 2011 up from 16.8 percent in 2010. The latest numbers show a 25 percent rise since 2007, before the latest recession, and a whopping 66 percent jump from 2001, the largest poverty increase in the country over the decade.

Sadly, the child poverty rate in Michigan increased by a staggering 34% over that 10-year period.

Michigan median household income fell dramatically, coming in at \$45,981 in 2011, almost a 20 percent drop in inflation-adjusted dollars over the decade, with income inequality continuing to grow.


"Michigan leaders have been busy dismantling the public programs and structures designed to get families with children through tough times. These new numbers show that we are going in the wrong direction by pulling the rug out from under struggling households," said Gilda Z. Jacobs, president and CEO of the Michigan League for Human Services.


Michigan was the first state to cut unemployment benefits from 26 weeks to 20 weeks. Last year, the Snyder administration instituted asset limits for federally funded food benefits. They also removed all college students from food benefits. For the first time in the last three years, the Soup Kitchen received many calls from college students looking for food assistance. The legislature also approved retroactive time limits for cash assistance going to the poorest families in the state, including families caring for disabled children. More working families will fall into poverty because the Michigan Earned Income Tax Credit has been cut by 70 percent, another action taken by the Legislature in 2011.

Speaking for The Soup Kitchen and our Michigan food banks, the removal of the Michigan income tax credit is expected to significantly reduce our donations. That is yet another blow to the very poor.

In the one bright spot reported, the number of uninsured decreased over the last two years, despite a 2.1 percent drop in the number of people with private health coverage since 2009. In 2011, 11.8 percent were uninsured, down from 12.4 percent a year earlier.
