# Moving along, moving back up. The Soup Kitchen is a stop along the way.



When we first spoke, Don was living in the shelter because he lost his disability support. Don has many illnesses, so working is not possible for him. Even getting around can be a challenge. Don has a bicycle that he uses for support when he walks the three blocks to the Social Security building.

Don said, "I have a lot of appreciation for the Soup Kitchen. I respect what you do here, and I want to thank the ladies (and men) who come here to give us a meal every day. I give respect when respect is due. I trust the Soup Kitchen. I saw a lady use a thermometer to temp the food. I'd do more for myself, and I have a food stamp card, but I'm in the shelter, so I can't cook any food."

"I also like coming here because I like to talk with people. And I want to thank the Soup Kitchen for saving my bike. I had it stolen twice, so the Soup Kitchen lets me put it inside at night."

Don regained his disability benefits in early September and now has his own place to live in Buchanan.

Mike is living in the shelter for the same reason—waiting to regain disability support. A paperwork snafu sent his disability notices to a couple of old addresses, and his support was dropped. Without money, he lost his home.

Mike is a Benton Harbor native. He has had disability support since 2009. The doctors say that in another 10 years the disintegrating discs in his spine will confine him to a wheel chair. Mike said, "I have been to the Soup Kitchen before when I needed it. It has saved me from going hungry many, many times. Of course I'm coming here more now. The food is way top notch at the Soup Kitchen. I'd be happy to do anything I can to give back."

When we first talked, Mike was worried about losing his place in the shelter because his 90-day-limit was rapidly approaching. I haven't asked for the particulars, but Mike is still in the shelter. When someone really needs the assistance and is making every effort to get housing, shelters will usually extend their stay.

### Why do people come to the Soup Kitchen. ?

Most guests fall into the following categories: 1) homeless 2) living below the poverty line 3) come here to see friends 5) stopping by to say thanks for past service.

So let's dig a little deeper. How does a person become homeless? If you are living in a place for free, you are considered homeless, whether it is a shelter or a friend's basement. If you are staying with a relative and s/he decides they don't want you there any more, you lose your home. People coming out of jail or prison often have no home to which to return. If they are lucky, the can get into a shelter. Some people coming out of prison are forced to live in a shelter, even if they have a home. Most people recently discharged from prison arrive here with only a small sack of clothes and a few personal belongings.

If the person had support from SSI or disability before being locked up, they have to start over to regain those benefits. The wait this time is shorter than the 3-5 years it usually takes to get disability support in the first place, but a quick turnaround would be six months.

So where are you then? A shelter does not have to keep a person for more than a month. The federal government only

pays a shelter to house a person for one month. Most do give them longer, but it is at the shelter's discretion. There are some "safe" times. Shelters cannot legally discharge a resident when the weather is dangerous enough to harm or kill a person. Most winter nights qualify for that, as do some excessively hot days.

Many people come here to eat to supplement the food they get from donations and state or federal support. Most of the older people only come near the end of the month when they are running short. We encourage them to come throughout the month so they don't get in a bind, but most choose not to.

Speaking of the older folks, many really do come here to see their friends. And we also have a large population of the mentally ill. This is one of the few places where they are welcome and where they are treated well. For many of them, this is their only social place.

One of the best reasons to come is to let us know how people are doing. Many of our guests say "thank you" every day, and many return to say thanks and let us know that they are doing better.
